BY-LAWS

Article I. Title

The As so ci a tion shall be known as the 196th Light In fan try Bri gade As so ci a tion.

Article II. Aims and Objectives

Section 1. To preserve and foster the spirit of fellow ship among for mer and possible future members of the 196th Light In fantry Brigade, U.S. Army, and provide an organization through which they may unite in bonds of comrade ship.

- Section 2. To com mem orate the mem ory of sol diers who gave their lives in the service of their country.
- Section 3. To support a national military that will promote stability and peace throughout the world.
- Section 4. To foster public under standing and support of the United States Army.

Section 5. To promote and per pet u ate those Army and unit tradi tions that contribute to esprit decorps and su perior per for mance of duty.

Article III. Membership

Section 1. Mem ber ship in the 196th Light In fan try Bri gade As so ci a tion shall be open to any sol dier, ac tive, retired or hon or ably dis charged Vet eran, who served or was at tached to the 196th Light In fan try Bri gade during its ac tive ser vice.

Section 2. Terms of Member ship. Member ship in the Association shall remain in force so long as the member main tains current status by payment of prescribed dues.

Article IV. Officers

Section 1. Enu mer a tion. The Offi cers of the As so ci a tion shall be a President who shall be the ChiefExecutive Offi cer, a Vice President, a Secretary and a Trea surer.

Section 2. Duties. The Officers of the Association shall admin is ter the affairs of the Association in accordance with the By-Laws.

Section 3. Terms and Election. The Presi dent and the Vice Presi dent shall be elected by the member ship, as provided in these By-Laws. The terms of office of the Presi dent and Vice Presi dent shall be two (2) years, and they shall be eligible for reflection. The other officers shall be appointed by the Presi dent.

Section 4. Va cancies in Elective Of fices. If the President va cates his of fice during his term, the Vice President shall succeed thereto.

Section 5. Honor ary Presidents. The Honor ary Presidency of the Association may be tendered after election by the member ship.

In those 7 weeks I also lost my fa ther, a 25th In fan try Di vi sion vet eran of World War II. He was laid to rest in a vet eran's cemetery in Cape May, NJ on Sep 10th. There was no honor guard, no taps. The flag was folded and presented by the funeral home per son nel. The only mil i tary vet eran to render a fi nal sa lute to him was me. Very sad, all in all.

It appears that our government just doesn't have enough money or manpower assets to honor it's veterans any more. So I guess it's up to us to take care of ourselves. We don't have the money or man power as sets ei ther, but what we do have is an in sep a ra ble bond forged in combat. That bond is what draws us together at least ev ery other year. It's what draws us together at parties, barbecues, weddings and ultimately at funerals. We stuck to gether in 'Nam and we need to stick to gether again, now more than ever.

I don't want to be right with out tell ing my broth ers how much they meant to me in Viet nam and through out my life.

I ac cepted the chal lenge of leading this As so ci a tion for just those rea sons. I want to make sure we stay in touch and continue to care about one another as we once did in combat. You can count on me. I've got your back!

PAST AND PRESENT HISTORY

635th MID

We received two e-mails informing us that the 635th Military Intelligence Detachment had been omit ted from our website.

I note your list does not include the 635th MID - Team 2, which served with the 196th at LZ Baldy and later at Hill 35 (?) near Tam Key in 1969.

The 635th was headquartered in Chu Lai. It operated the POW cage and sent Special Agents off with infantry and tracks to de ter mine where VC and NVA units were located and where they had cached food and weap ons.

SENATE OKS NOR MAL-IZING TRADE RE LA TIONS WITH VIETNAM

THEASSOCIATEDPRESS

U.S. - Viet namese relations moved to a new level with Senate approval of an agree ment nor malizing trade be tween the two for merenemies.

The Sen ate vote was 88 - 12 on Oc tober 3rd, 2001. The House endorsed the measure last month, and President Bush said he will sign it.

Opposition to the deal came mainly from lawmakers who asserted that Vietnam has not fully co op er ated in ac counting for MIAs from the Viet nam War and should not be en titled to nor mal trade because of its poor human rights record.

Viet Cong Offensive Seen Foiled

DAU TIENG, South Viet Nam—The commanding general of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division said Wednesday the six day "Battle of Tay Ninh" near here may have halted a planned Viet Cong "Winter" offensive.

Maj Gen William E. Depuy told newsmen at his base camp here that a captured document indicated a buildup of Vset Cong forces and supplies in Tay Ninh Province was part of an offensive planned for the "cool" season which normally starts here about mid-November.

So far, in six days of fighting, four major U.S. units involved have claimed a total of 843 Viet Cong killed and "huge quantities" of ammunition and equipment captured.

Depuy said he believed the Viet Cong planed to attack a village outpost about two miles northwest of her Nov. 4 or 5. Three guerrills regiments were believed to be vonverging on the outpost from three sides, he said.

The 196th Light Infantry Brigade, which sparked the series of bitter fighting, almost certainly ran into the flank of the Viet Cong movement while searching for rice caches in the area, the general said.

When American reinforcements were moved into the area, the Viet Cong were faced with only two alternatives, Depuy said—either leave the area and start their buildup again, or stay and fight for their base camps.

He said he believed the Viet Cong chose to fight to protect vast quantities of equipment concealed in the area.

Depuy said troops from the 101st North Vietnamese Regiment were identified in the fighting. He said a captured North Vietnamese efficer told interrogators he had been sent to South Viet Nam a month ago.

The general said American forces captured 490 mines, nearly 20,000 grenades and more than 1000 pounds of explosives since the operation, officially codenamed "Attleboro," began,

Overall American essualties in the operation were derecribed as light, although three others "moderate" casualties in bloody clashes Friday.





RE UNION LETTER BRINGS GOOSEBUMPS

Upon re view ing the Get tys burg ma te ri als, I had a sec ond sig nif i cant goosebump moment. The first was about 1980ish. I had joined the Ma rine Corps in 1979, af ter be ing out for several years. While visiting DC en route to a service school, a group of us stopped at Arlington National Cemetery to look around and see the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Un known Sol dier. On the way, we stopped to look at the Kennedy site, with the eter nal flame. As we walked off to go to the guard cer e mony, I looked down at a small headstone. I don't re mem ber the name, but the sol dier was killed on 5 Jan 68, and be longed to C 2/1.

Now I re ceive the re union no tice and dis cover that a me mo rial cer e mony will be performed for Sp4 Runk, also killed on 5 Jan 68, with C 2/1. The rea son for my chicken skin is that the first oc ca sion (a ca sual glance at a head stone) is 12 YEARS af ter the fact, and the 2d oc ca sion (your no tice) is 33 YEARS af ter the fact, and that out of ev ery thing that goes on in this big old world, peo ple, places, stuff, etc., this in sig nif i cant day (5 Jan 68) in the his tory of the world, is a day I share with these two in di vid u als. If you break out your Il lus trated His tory of Chargers, The Viet nam War, by F. Clifton Berry, Jr., turn to pages 89-92, you can read an ac count of the events be fall ing C 2/1 on 5 Jan 68. Page 91 men tions A, 4/31, the sig nals (whis tle vs. Flash light) used to en ter the C 2/1 per im e ter, and the point man. The point man was me, then 2d Lt Wat son, FNG (about 10 days with A 4/31). My pla toon was point, we had some per son nel/tem per prob lems and I per sonally took the point so we could get where we needed to go, C 2/1. It took us about three hours. Later, after the linkup, I received minor wounds, grenade fragments, and was medevaced the next morn ing (which is also de scribed in the book) on about the eighth chop per load of wounded.

After being medevac'd and convalescing, I was transferred and returned in early to mid-Feb to B, 4/31 where I re mained un til approx Sept 68. First CO was Capt Speer. After he was wounded Capt Wolfe took over. I may recall more B Co. names than A, 4/31 names

Af ter I got the goose bumps, I told my wife and she en cour aged me to con tact you because of my as so ci a tion with the in ci dent which claimed the life of your re union honoree.

As a side note, I men tioned the Ma rine Corps above. I re tired in 1996 as CWO3 with 16 years in counterintelligence. I went from Pvt. to Lt. (OCS) in the Army, and from Sgt to CWO3 in the Ma rine Corps. I en joyed it so much, I had to Mus tang twice. The 80s were pretty tame, but I got to Mt. Pinatubo while sta tioned in the Phil ip pines with NCIS in 91 and So ma lia in 93 during the hunt for El vis.



BOOK RESEARCH BRINGS RESPONSE

The following response was received in an swer to a request for book research in our last news let ter. The request was from author Dan Mahon. It makes in terest ingreading Dear Dan,

I think I have some in for ma tion that may be of help to you.

I served in the sec ond pla toon, C Com pany, 4th Bat tal ion, 31st In fan try, 196th LIB in the RVN from 19 OCT 68 to 19 OCT 69. Of fi cially I was a E-5 squad leader but, on and



off because I was senior the field NCO, acted as the platoon sgt or pla toon leader, depending where the vacancies where. The in di vid u als you are looking for were in my pla toon. I've attached a few pages of my diary, and a picture of me in Aug 69.

I recognized 6 of the names on your list: Cannito, Craig, Howell,

Robertson (Robbie), and Taylor. Hetzel and Nelson were probably in our platoon as well. We had picked up some "new guys" on our "stand down" in Chu Lai 16 to 18 JUL 69. At that point I was get ting "short (a dou ble digit midget)" and I was no lon ger re ally interested in knowing new faces. Hetzel and Nelson (I seem to remember this name)

were probably there because 8 of our pla toon were killed that day.


Included is an an interesting photo taken after a firefight that lasted most of the day. The devastated forest is typical after receiving 105/155mm artillery support. You know a person is REALLY tired when they're too tired to remove their heavy pot (helmet). Also, no body is in the mood to talk. I know I have some pic tures or slides of Robbie and Tay lor. If I look closely, I probably have Cannito, Howell, and Craig in the back ground of some photos.

On 26 AUG 69 we had point for most of the Battalion (3 of the compa-

nies were in the field). We were ex pect ing to make con tact some where in the foot hills to the moun tains ahead of us as we had the day be fore. Be cause BN HQ wanted us to make con tact quickly, we took what we thought was a small risk by mov ing in the open rice paddies to get into the foothills. Dur ing the night the NVA had moved closer to us and set an ambush. When most of the platoon was in the open, they opened fire. Simulta-



neously they opened with the machine gun at our point, pre-arranged mor tar fire mission that started at our rear and walked up the paddy to our point, and automatic weapon fire to our left. I was was near the middle and had that ex tra sec ond to react. Taylor was on point and never

had a chance. We fell to the right (lower) side of the dike away from the AK fire and the NVA started pound ing it with RPG rounds. Most of the dike held and we were able to low crawl back to the main company with our wounded. It seemed like hours or days that we had been out there, but it all took place in a mat ter of min utes. I'm not sure what you need for your research. Another resource you may want to check is CBS/AP/UPI. In my diary I noted that AP/UPI photographers spent most of the day with us (on 21 AUG 69) and that CBS News (Tony Sargeant) had interviewed Robby with a TV camera. He gave a rather fiery re view of the war from his per spec tive. Coming from a 14 year Army vet, we were all proud of him.

I hope this helps. Good Luck with your re search.
