he first iadependent liakt infantery briv. gade is the U. S. Amy was activated is September 1965 at Fort Devens, Massachmetts, by Geberal Ooder Naw. ber 266, Beadquartets. Fisst United Sates Mey, Fort Jaye. New Yorl. Its foreation was a tesale of the beiksp of coebat sterigth repaired in Vietaas.

At the same tibe a sew coecept of training was in. trofoced - the first sisce the days of Wald War I. Recraits, ealistees, and ibdectecs mere assigned to the 196t imoediately after their indection isto the Army. Their estire training prtiol -8 weels each of Basic Coebat and Avanced Individual Trainizg, as well as a fima1 8 weeks of Basic Unit Training = was spent with the Brisade.

Its strostete dictated by the tactical pribeiples of conaterimsergescy, the bew Beigade coetains $\$ 800$ offi. cers and men. Almont oee-thidd wete transfetted to the $196 t h$ froe the ad lifanary Brigade, former tesants of Fort Devens. This Beigade was trasslerted in September 1965 to its pacest Sth Divisioe at Fort Carsoe, Colcerado. The wes it left beliad, plas a nember froe other posts asd units, brought their laowledge of Arwy life and training uethods to the 196 hl and 8000 bem secruits.

## 1st INFANTRY REGIMENT

The Ist Infantry dates back so 1791 mbes it was ossasized is New Espland. Now more than 175 years old. this secoed ofdest sait of the Regelar Army tefls a great pant of the story of oen coesory sisce Revolntionary days.

The Regiment was aatborized mber the serw Cowsess vecogsized that, dee so the drpartere of the Bitish, the frontiet was in orsperate sered of organiaed peotection from the ledians.

Origially the 2d Infantry, the designation was changed the following year, in 1792 , to the 2 S Sab-Legiot. The ted of the Sob-Legion is sbown on the Regimental Coat of Anes.

There followed there years of ocostant warface agaisst the Mani todians in wlat aee now the nidwesters states. The Commasdet, Gen.Arthar St, Clain, was oee of the first of easy famoes manes ansociated with the Ist Infantry. Folloning the conpletioe of this first campaign in 1795, the Regimental designation oece again became the 30 Infantry.

The weat 15 years to the war of 1812 were years of peace, though sot of inactivity. The focetiers stall secded geaphag asd vast territories of the Kest seeded exploring. Seutlers wete begisniag to move inso those virgie lasals and it was necessary to secone and stabilize the inesene areas of the Xississippi asd Wistoari rivet valteys. It was dering this period of the coenery's first great migra. tios westwad that the motelo of the lst came into bring. Serper Primss-Always First.

Fotlowing these interesting asd velatively peacefol days of eational expansion, the Regiment mas once again called wowe to defesd the conntry when the British pested us into the wat of tsiz.

The thece years of war wese calminated in the bante of New Otleass, ose of the nowt tesounding defeats ever seffered by the British. Valer comeand of Aadrew Jackson, the Tesurssee volanteres, the Regular Arny, is Isfantry asd celer usits, and the colorfal pirates of Jean Lafitte, stood belisd their beastworks matching the tisers of red-cosed British infansy mardh bowands then owt of the fog. The bayoect-tipped, disciplised tanks advanced over the marshy gmoud bowatds the Aorticans, slowly and suecly. Alter all, bey were crack veterans of Materloo and obler Eeroperan campaiges. Who could suad agaisst them?

The Americans, budly ootsumbered, bet peotected by eants asd logs, beld their fire usil they coald "see the whites of the enemy's eyes," as at Bunker Hill.

Whes the eseny's lises appeoached the beavwod. the order was gives bo fire. The shotet mazale lobders of the Aserticat Infastry, the long rifles of the Tesecssee sharpshoters, and the assouted wrapoes of Lafitte's pirate crew ctated bavor in the Britiob ranks.

Wen it was over, de British had saffeted oac of their woost defeats. Haskeds were dead, masy more hosdieds woosded. American casealties sembered less than 50. Never agais woold the British of any caler coentry advasce like this against an Anecican battle lise.

The tragic part of this spectacelar bante was that peace had been signed some wreks before. The war was over, Bot seither side keew of it yel. New Otteass was mancessary, bot pethaps it could be jestified in that the worldheew sow that Aserica was a majot power.

Ose of its moce spectacular operations took place against the Siowx, defeating Lame Deer asd earning a coencsla. tiod from General Philip Steridan.

Then it was Tenas agais, and, after a two year bow of ganrisoe life, the Ist west off to campaign in Arirosa aglinst Cetcoimo asd his Aparlies. It was the last and bloodiest of the gitat Indian sprisiegs.

The sext time the Senper Primss went into action was is Ceba dering the Spasish-Asericaa Kat. It seoesed the slopes of San Jean Hill with Teddy Roosevelt and took part is the captere of Santiago, adling meer battle streamers to its colors.

The Ist was then off to the Plalippises whete it belged to pat down the More Insanection. Daing a two yeat period in 1901-190., the Regincst campaigaed on the island of Samar, fidhtiex bundreds of separate major and misor pitched battles in the jangles and moantains of the islasd.

When Would Man 目 bocke ost, the Regimat was part of the 6ill Division. After extensive talining is the U.S. if mas sent overseas to New Gainea, via Hawaii. It tool part in the invasion of Maffie Bay, figleing the Japasese is the ruged battles of Loee Tece Ifill asd Rocky Peine.

In Jaweary of 1945, the Ist Infantry weat is ower the beaches at Lingayee Galf, Lapos, the Philippise Islands. The fighing for t.eron ant flataan was ruceet, bet, in the end, seccessfal. The Regiecst was is action for 219 consecetive days at one poist, suffering oner 300 K.I.A. (Killed is Actice) as compared to the 3500 Japanese K.I.A.

For its actions in Woeld War II, the Ist lafantry was awarded a Distingwisked Lail Citation for New Geisea and a Philippise Presidential Unit Citation.

## 21st INFANTRY REGIMENT

The listocy of the Sd Batralion, 21st Infastry, Brgan during the eaily past of the Civil Wan, by proclamation of Ptesideat Abrahaa Liscoln. Its orgasiration tool place oe 28 May 1862 whea Coepany C, 24 Banalios, 1203 Infanty, was fonmed at Fort Hamilton, N.Y., as part of the Regalar Arey. The anit was reorgasized asd redesignated as Company C. 2lst IMastry, is 7 Decenber 1866, follow. ing the eod of the war.

The battes and campaiges of the 21st tead like a bisfocy of that serrible coeflict between North asd Sowth. Amoeg the 11 streamers earned daring the Kar Betwees the States, stand oet the awesces mames of Fredericksbarg and Clascellosville; Sporsylvasia, Cold Harbor asd Petersbarg. As part of the Union Arny it belged to bold the lise asd ture the tide at Gettysberg. It went os the oflensive in the barning thickets of the Wildersess. Particulatly sevete casealties wete sastaised at Secoed Bell Ren in the Masassas caspaige and in the orelands at Bloody Antictas.

The 21st's laptise of fire occened at Cedar Moantain. 9 Ausust 1862 . A cedar tree, cemsemerating that batile, is part of the Regimestal Coat of Arma.

Is 1869. Coepany C was consolidated with abother Company C, that of the 52od lafantry, and assigned to the Terrisory of Nizoea. Operating froe Casp Verde, the Elst belped to defend and stabilize be sontheres focetice, canpaigning againat the Wodocs asd the Nez Petces. Otber campaigns were condected against varions Indian tribes is the Tentitory thoegh 1870 . Fee the sext two decades the Regiscst kept the peace, securing the atea
for the sew settlements of a groming country. The Crest of the Coat of Nes shows foer arrows for the Isdian caepaigns. The arrows are mrapped by a saakeskin, an lisdias syebtol of mar.

Is IN92, the mbole of the 2lst came together agais at Plattsberg Barracks, N.Y. Its sext actioe came when this coustry west to war with Spaie in 1898 . The Regiment carned a campaige streamer for its Gighting at Santiago. Caba. A Give-sided bastioned fork desiga sbows above the cedar tree becasse of its assignment to V Corps.

Soutly afterwards, the Regiment was sest bo the Plillippise Islasts to pot dows the Moeo Insartectioa. which lasted troes 1899 to 1900 . Soccessive campaiges aloog the Zapote River and is Lexoe occupied we 21s for the next four years. Peace finally came and the Phis. ippines have been stansch friends of the U.S. sitce they Broke froen Spaaish rale. Fer its services, the E1sr's Coat of Aems inclodes the Katiposas Sen.

Dering Korld War 1 the Regiment sewed along the Hevican boeder. helping to keep peace is the part of the woold where basdits like Pascbo Villa were creating toweble.

The minit was assigsed to the 16th Division in 1918, was demobilised is 1919 and reactivated is 1921 as pant of the Hwaiiaa Division. In 1911, the 21st mas assigned to the 2tith Division asd was headpeatered at Yochofield Barracks at the time of Peat Harbor. 7 Decembet 1911. Fot the sext two years, the asit was exgaged in coastal delense deties in the Islasds.

Finally, Die Division was alened and sailed for Asstralia is late 1943. Thete followed an extessive period of training is that coentry "Bons esder."

The first teal figling for the Reginent in World Mar II came when they were sest asbore is New Gainea, spear. beating as assable against the Japabese at Tanalmeral Buy. The date was 22 April 1944 , and the Divisioe soved rapilly thoogh rais-souked forests to captere Hollasdia Airfield.

Thes came the invasion of the Philippises. The 2lst lasded at Red Beach oe Leyte is October. Heavy fighting occured on Leyte, Lazon and other islands in the Southen Plilippines. The Division asd the ZIse sulfered masy casealties in the land-fought jongte canpaigns to Joly of 1945. That it did its iob well is attested to by a Peesideatial Unit Citation, awarted by a gatefat Philippise Governsent, finally free of the Japasese oecopation.

back to Japas. bet reterned to Korea in t55s, the oaly sait called upoe to do two separate toars.

The 2tst aifed so campaizn streamers io its cofors in 太ocea. The "Gimlets" were a fighting oesfit, as evidenced by two U.S. Distingaished Unit Citations and two Repoblic of Koera Presidrstial Unit Citaticos.

Ib additioe to these booses, the "Ginless" were presested with a lage Ginlet stick. The persentatice was made by the Royal Sassex Regiscot of Geeat Britain as a tokes of their esteen.

Oe Sepkember 15. 1965, the 34 Battalice of this fa. moes regimat was reactivated isto the Regolar Army at Fort Devens, Massachwetts and assigoed to the semly - formed 196es Light Imfastry Brigade.

The oflicial motto of the 2Is Infantry is DUTY. The woed is spelled oet on the Coat of Anes. It meass the same to the soldice of 1966 as it did to the sollier of 1862 when a tradisioe was born at Cedar Mowntain. If will mean the same a hedted years from sow, foe it tepeescats everything that made this nation geat.

## 31st INFANTRY REGIMENT

The colorful "Foreign Legion" of the U.S. Army began 40 years ago in the Philippine Islands when the new 31st Infantry was organized at Regan Barracks, Camp McGrath and Fort William McKinley.

The 31st was the first full infantry regiment ever assigned to the Philippines and until 1958 it had never had duty within the continental limits of the U.S.

The Polar Bear Regiment is one of the few units of the U.S. Army ever to fight on Russian soil. It is a little known chapter of American history--a sort of forgotten, unpleasant little war fought in the cold of Siberia against a tough and elusive Red Army of Russian Communists.

It was the first time a regular U.S. force had ever engaged an organized Communist Army, and it turned out to be a frustrating experience.

The 31st was born in 1916, just as the war clouds of a European war were about to darken American skies. When war did come for the U.S. in 1917, it did not seem as if the Regiment would ever see combat on the Western front. And it never did.

The Regiment that wears a polar bear on its Crest in recognition of its Siberian campaign remained in its various barracks around Manila until called upon to form part of the American Expeditionary Force to Siberia. The Russian Revolution of 1917, which pitted the new Red Army against the Czarist White Army was going badly for the Royalist forces, despite the help of a sizable Czech army. The Allies decided to commit combat units to help
stabilize the country and put down the Red Revolt. In European Russia, it was Americans, French and English; in Siberia, the Americans, Japanese and Chinese.

In August, the Regiment was disembarked from the Army transport Logan in the Far Eastern port of Vladivostok. Their mission--to help out the White Army and the Czechs by keeping open the Trans-Siberian railway and to guard supplies, mines and centers of communication. The Russians reacted violently and the first American casualties were suffered in that forgotten war.

There were many isolated, fierce little skirmishes during the months of 1918-1919. Towns were fought over and vital centers of operation were contested. The winter cold caused much frostbite and discomfort.

Weather, terrain and Russians made for rugged soldiering, and, although the Regiment gave an outstanding account of itself in all encounters, the whole business seemed doomed to failure. International politics, on both Allied and Communist sides made the situation complicated and hopeless. The Armistice had brought an end to the war in Europe and people everywhere were tired of wars and killing. America wanted its soldiers home.

It was inevitable. In January of 1920, the A.E.F. was withdrawn, and the 31st went back home to Manila. After assignment to the Philippine Division, the peacetime life of garrison duty was the order of the day for the next two decades.

Only once was this peaceful routine interrupted. As tensions in the Far East built up with Japan on the of-

fensive in China, the Regiment was ordered to Shanghai in early 1932 with a mission of protecting American lives and property in that city.

The International Settlement, Shanghai Race Track and Soochow Creek became familiar names to the battalions of the 31st. Japanese-Chinese fire around and about them was something they learned to live with. The 4th Marines were also stationed in Shanghai and there were occasions when men of the 31st were known to violently defend themselves against the reported cockiness of the Marine Corps. The spirited rivalry between the two services produced a number of light casualties, none of which were fatal. It was an outlet for emotions and helped to build a tradition.

Five months later, the 31st was back in Manila. Officers and men of the Regiment were awarded the Yangtze Service Medal for their action in Shanghai, the only time until recently that an Army unit had been awarded a combat medal in peacetime.

One other momento of Shanghai came to the 31st and has its place in the Regiment today. Officers of the 31st had a silver bowl and 66 cups made out of 1500 Chinese silver dollars as a remembrance of China Service. The "Shanghai Bowl" is part of the 31st's tradition.

The Regiment was to suffer its worse days when the Japanese attacked the Philippines in December, 1941. It was sent to the Lingayen Beaches to try to repel a superior Japanese landing force. The "Polar Bears" and

their Philippine comrades-in-arms were forced to withdraw to Bataan, fighting violent rearguard actions all the way. There were many casualties - men of the Regiment who fought the invader as best they could, then died along a jungle path.

In an ever-shrinking perimeter, the Americans fell back from defense line to defense line. They fought until April against impossible odds, holding an enormous Japanese Army at bay during a critical time. Finally, the Regiment was surrendered to the Japanese 14th Army on 9 April 1942. The Regimental Colors were burned and the Shanghai Bowl buried so that the Japanese could obtain neither. On that day, the 31st Infantry was removed from Army rolls.

The broken remnants of the 31st were sent on the infamous Death March from Bataan to the prison camp. Many more died making this awful march. Brutality on the part of their captors and bravery on the part of defeated men stumbling to a prison were commonplace. Others would die in captivity at Camp O'Donnell in the months to come and on the seas when being removed to Japan. Many would not survive those terrible three years.

For its heroism in defense of the Philippines, the 31st Infantry was awarded three Distinguished Unit Citations, and a Philippine Presidential Unit Citation.

The Regiment was brought into being again on January 8, 1946, in Korea as part of the 7th Infantry Division. It was on occupation duty in that country until January, 1948, when it was sent to Japan, there to perform routine garrison duty until the outbreak of the Korean War.

As part of the 7th Division, the Polar Bears were sent into action in September of 1950, landing at Inchon. The 31st helped to recapture Seoul, the capital city. With other U.N. forces, the Regiment attacked and drove the
broken North Korean Army to the north. The advance was continued into North Korea, almost to the Yalu River. Then, when it seemed almost over, the Chinese came in.

The American troops tried to hold, but finally had to begin their withdrawal to the south. Heavy casualties were sustained by the Polar Bears at Chosin Reservoir. The weather was fiercely cold.

The withdrawal was an ordeal. Outnumbered, infiltrated and shot at by hordes of Chinese on nearby hills, the troop convoys fought their way down the roads leading south. Casualties were severe, both from the Chinese and the cold. The Regiment fought its way out, bringing its wounded, though losing much of its transportation. Infantry fire fights in the hills and point blank artillery fire allowed them to evacuate at Hamhung and then to Pusan.

Then began the long road back north. The 31st, along with other U.N. troops, drove up to the 38th parallel where the line was stabilized upon commencement of the Armistice talks.

The fighting was just as hard. Patrolling and position warfare produced their inevitable casualties. The 31st had two Medal of Honor winners near "Heartbreak Ridge." "Pork Chop Hill" was defended by the Regiment. The fighting on Pork Chop was so consistently violent that a book was written about it, followed by a movie of the same name.

For its role in the Korean War, the 31st Infantry was awarded two Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citations, and most interesting, two Navy Presidential Unit Citations and a Navy Unit Commendation. Few Army units have been so recognized by the Navy.

Appropriately, enough, the motto on the Regimental Crest is Pro Patria--For Country.

Capt. Antonio Sola, Co. D, 4th Battalion, 31st Infantry, was a Sergeant in the same company of the 31st in the Korean War.

## 82d ARTILLERY

World War I brought about the organization of the 82d Artillery. The Battalion was created shortly after the U.S. entered the War and was assigned to the 15 th Cavalry Division. It did not see combat and in 1921 was assigned to the 1st Cavalry Division with which it would serve in World War II and Korea.

The field artillery was horse-drawn throughout those 20 some years of peacetime. Guns, mostly the 75 mm , but some 3 -inch, were moved by horses. The artillerymen rode along with their guns. So, we have the traditional name of Horse Artillery. In honor of those days, Pega'sus, the flying horse, forms part of the Battalion Crest. Compared to the walking infantry, it did seem as ir tne artillery was really "flying" along astride their welltrained mounts. Duty was mostly out of Fort Bliss, Texas, where there was plenty of room for maneuvers.

Also commemorated on the 82d's insignia is the Battalion's one action until World War II. A white band, representing the Rio Grande, and a black projectile inscribed thereon, teil of its participation in events along
the Mexican border in 1919. Pancho Villa was rampaging around the area at the time and the 82 d found occasion to send a number of rounds across the river in support of the 7th and 8th Cavalry.

The 1st Cavalry Division moved out of Fort Bliss in June of 1943, heading for Australia and Pacific combat. The 82 d was equipped with 75 mm pack howitzers and by this time had turned in its horses in exchange for trucks to haul both its guns and men.

Its best known Pacific campaigns were in the Bismark Archipelago where it saw action in the Admiralties with the 1st Cavalry Division and in Leyte and, Luzon in the Philippines. When it went in with the landing force at Leyte, it had received the 105 mm howitzer which was used to the end of the war. The Battalion "unloaded" countless rounds into Japanese positions in support of the 5th, 7th and 8th Cavalry Regiments.

For its efforts in the liberation of the Philippines, the 82d Artillery was awarded a Philippine Presidential Unit Citation.

Then it was Japan and occupation duty. While stationed there, it was equipped with the new 155 mm 's.

When the Korean War broke out, the 82 d went into action in support of the 7th Cavalry. It made the long journey into North Korea, almost to the Yalu River, when U.N. forces broke the back of the North Korean Army in the late summer of 1950. Until then it had helped hold the line in the first anxious months of the War.

Caught by the Chinese Intervention in North Korea, the Americans were forced to withdraw below the 18th Parallel. The 82d was caught up in the confusion and cold of that first Korean winter. The U.N. troops went on the offensive again, and a grinding, smashing campaign pushed the Chinese back north. Lines were more or less stabilized during the long Armistice talks, but there was constant fighting for strategic terrain.

It was in these hard-fought, local actions that the American Artillery lived up to its reputation, and more so. Since the Civil War when Union Army artillery had distinguished itself in such campaigns as Chicamauga under General Thomas ("They stood like a rock"), in the Peninsula campaigns in Virginia and at Gettysburg, American artillery had built a reputation for excellence. The tradition carried into World War I in France and World War II in the European and Pacific Theaters. Its well-directed, expert fire was recognized by both friend and foe as perhaps the most significant contribution to battles where artillery could be used.

In Korea, artillery became a true science. Books have been written about its efficiency. In the rugged battles on the hills and ridges, massed artillery was the difference. Artillerymen could, and did, use all types of fire from saturation to sharpshooting a single round, from laying smoke screens or lighting up the night with flares. The gunners could 'walk" around a hill, over it, support an advance or fire point blank at the enemy in defense of a position. They used their high explosive projectiles to wreak havoc on personnel and gun emplacements. The infantry would often call fire near to and even into their own positions to drive off a swarming, Chinese horde. "On the way"' became a familiar expression. Exploding shells could clean off the tops of bunkers while our troops crouched inside. The 82 d was part of this.

For its support of Greek U.N. troops, and in recognition of the Battalion's achievements during the Korean War, a grateful Greek Government decorated the colors of the 82d Artillery with the Bravery Gold Medal of Greece.

The 82d was also awarded a Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation for its heroism at Waegwon-Taegu.

The Battalion was finally sent back to Japan with the end of the War and remained in standby until deactivated in 1957.

It was activated again in 1958 in Germany, then deactivated once more in 1963 in Germany, its last duty until its official assignment to the 196th Light Infantry Brigade.

COLONEL FRANCIS S. CONATY, JR., U.S.A.

Francis S. Conaty, Jr., was born in Rockford, Illinois, May 15, 1920. He was graduated from The Citadel, Charleston, South Carolina, on June 1, 1940, and one year later commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army Reserve.

The son of a career soldier, Colonel Conaty came on active duty in September 1941 and served in the South Pacific as a mechanized cavalry commander in the Americal division during World War II.

From 1960 to 1964 Colonel Conaty served on the Army Staff in Washington, D.C., in both the Office of the Chief, Research and Development, and the Office of the Army Chief of Staff. His next assignment was in July of

1964 when he was appointed Senior Advisor to the 9th Infantry Division, U.S. Military Assistance Command, Vietnam.

Colonel Conaty assumed command of the 2d Brigade 5th Infantry Division (M) at Fort Devens, Massachusetts, in August 1965. One month later he was named to command the newly-activated 196th Light Infantry Brigade when the 2d Brigade was transferred minus personnel and equipment to its home station of Fort Carson, Colorado.

Colonel Conaty is the holder of the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star with "V" device and Oak Leaf Cluster, Purple Heart, and Air Medal (1st, 2d Oak Leaf Cluster).


COLONEL CHARLES P. MURRAY, JR., U.S.A.

A native of Baltimore, Maryland, Colonel Murray is the 196th's Executive Officer and the holder of the Congressional Medal of Honor.

He is a graduate of the University of North Carolina and George Washington University, where he was awarded an M.A. Degree in International Affairs. The Colonel is also a graduate of the Army Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia; The Canadian Army Staff College, and the National War College.

His significant peacetime assignments include Chief of the Planning Branch, Plans Division G-4, for the Eighty Army in Korea; Executive Officer and Deputy

Commander for the 1st Battle Group, 3d Infantry, at Fort Myer, Virginia; and Personnel Staff Officer for both the Policy Branch and Procurement Division, Officer of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Washington, D.C.

The Brigade's only Medal of Honor winner, Colonel Murray received this country's highest decoration for outstanding heroism near Kaysersberg, France.

During the eight-month period from October 1944 to May, 1945, the then 1st Lieutenant Murray also won the Silver Star with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Bronze Star with first Oak Leaf Cluster and French Croix de Guerre with Silver Gilt Star for Valor.


## FORT DEVENS

The countryside around Fort Devens and the land on which it stands has supported marching troops for more than 300 years.

In 1636-1676 a company of Dragoons, soldiers who were loyal to the British Crown as well as their adopted home in New England, was garrisoned from their commanding officer's home, the site of which is near the main gate of Devens.

Three hundred years later, the ground echoes to the footsteps of the infantrymen of the 196th Light Infantry Brigade. A lot of history has flowed across the rolling New England hills since the red-coated dragoons paraded in a clearing in the wilderness.

Simply by being here at Fort Devens, the troops of the 196th have, in a sense, inherited the traditions of those who have passed through this way in former years.

In the early days, colonists in the small settlements of the area defended themselves against the Indians, mostly through their own efforts. That they were not always successful is a matter of history. King Philip's War in 1675-1677, saw the Indians destroy the local settlements, massacring the people and burning their homes.

Still, a gradual stabilizing of the area took place and even before the Revolution such units as Rogers Rangers were roaming through the countryside in pursuit of warlike French and Indians.

When the Revolution finally came in 1775, there existed groups of citizen-soldiers, or Minute-Men as they were called, in every New England community. They marched on the roads to Concord and Lexington and to Bunker Hill from every home and village in this area. Men served at Saratoga and Valley Forge; they marched to Quebec with Benedict Arnold.

Finally, it was over, but the need for trained soldiers still existed. Mostly, they were Militia; sometimes it was necessary to absorb individuals into regular units as was done in the War of 1812 .

When the Civil War erupted, the population in the Fort Devens area had increased tremendously since the times of King Philip and George III. Hundreds of men marched to join the Union Army from every community-Groton, Ayer, Littleton, and all the rest. In those days, men of the same area were formed into Regiments of the States. Men from this area, with certain exceptions, were brought together in the same Massachusetts Regiments.

Asother period of expansion occerred is 1940 mben Earope weat to war again. More thas a thowsasd wood frame baildings, incleding the baracks, ecss halls and clagels sow in sse, were conserected to boese and care for the thossands of incoming draftees.

He is told something of the military sebjects that will be covered during bis traiting. He is advised if the ways of the Army and in all matters which migh coacetn his personal welfate. Lecteves in Coester-Geerilla asd Cosster-lnsergency Karface are gives and be is exposed to bis firm marching eeders asd drilling commands. Everyling is sew.

Derisg the secosd week, the recreit is formally istrodoced to the infastryman's basic weapon-the M-14 nile. After be is acgeainted with the mechanics of what
will be his "best friend" is the months to come, he is tangh bow to sse it. Live firing on the range at the end of the week tests foe marksmanship asd eaposes the tecrait to his first meaningfel exercise of a combat natere. Mee lis tifle fites the first time, be ksoms for certain the type of business be is is.
lo the third week of traizing, the traiser is tested in varioes subjects. He is also iatrodeced to elementary firs abd procederes and the ibevitable geard dety. Firing for the recond follows at the ead of this thind werk. Coes. petition foe ligh scores and pealification badges makes this phase ose of the lighlights of Basic Combat Trais. ing.

Plysical traizing is a very secessary part of the soldier's conditioning. Calistherics and P.T. ate the oofer of the day and in the foorth week traisess take their initial fitacss tests. Also, dering the same week. that very valealle, all perpose weagoo, the bayoset is introdaced bo the recresit.

The traiace is now realy for a ragged Sth week. Asoanft and infiltratioe courses presest theit varioes challenges. The tecruit by this time has sseally learned to lasdle himself and is ooegher physically than when he first amivect. Nevertheless, the coarses are anything bet easy for most.

The pace of the training increases rapidly as the wecks go grickly by. Night firing is part of the sisth week's progas. Ksowledge of first aid asd saatitation mentally coedition the recroit for coebat servival. Attentioe to sech instrectice, whethet in weapoery of first aid, eay save a soldier's life some day.

The formal part of Basic Coelat Training instractice ends in the sevenhl week. Hasd greasde instrection, thea the actaal throwing of live greaades, is a newex. perience for moat. Safety is the woed and once the initial servosserss is over, the isfastry recreit las mas. tered another of lis basic weagoss. Were coebat firing wisds ap the weel.

The traitec bow catets his eiglth and fixal werk. All that he las learsed daring the preceding seven weeks is sotaled at this time. Pooliciency testing is all phases of Basic Training rates the tecrait on his mastery of what he has been taught. It is the celnination of the finst phase of his Arey traising. Nont ate ready to go ea to the secood phase. Advasced Infantry Training. the is sol yet a fell-ftedged sotdier, bet be is ce the way. Ile will reach fall materity in the moens to come.

The bayoeet bas always bere an infantryma's weapoe, although its gresent day importance is perlapos not as great as it was a centery or two ago when the rasge of the masket of sifle was moch less thas it is soow

Thes, it was standard practice for a lise of infantry so make a bayoert charge following a mesket volley. This buppered partly because of the slow rate of ecload. ing and it woold be eccessary to get at the ewerey gaickty before be cond recover. and partly to test the encery's Berve against "cold steel." It was obtee said that the teal testing of a soldiet came whee be coold stand agaisst a bayoert charge of afvatce against an eacmy with nothing bot this weapoe is froet of him.

The Eaglish, Germass and other Eevopean countrics developet the ant of bayonet fidtring so a ligh degee of efficiescy. The Anericans were mose proee to ase good asd effective fifle fite whenever possible. Daring RevoIutioeary days through the Civil War, the bayoect, bow ever, was weed a great deal. Whea Koeld Maf I and the machine ges came aloeg, be ieportance of the bayonet began so declise in direct proportion to the increase in fiecpower, althongh it was still ingortas is difecing out a well istrearbed encmy.

By Korld Var II. the bayoeet charge was peetly moch a thing of the past, although troops soevtimers had the seed so sse it. It is always better to be safe than sonry and mbes a line of infastry advances into a mood lise of up the slope of a litt, it is reasorring to limow you live a bayeect to use if yoer rifle jams.

There are few nodern instances of an old-fashioned bayeect charge. One of the last was is Nocea when Anerican Infantry chatged the Chusese with bayoects cely. The Clisese beoke and ran.

Now, it seill has a practical, undividoal ase. Petlaps the soldier ases it to flesh oet a dag-in gerrilla; possibly be uses it to open a cas of C ratices. It certainly coeses is lasdy whee steerigg a prisower alomg. There"s sout of an international langeage that says that a jas in the teaf meass "go allead."


## RIFLE RANGE



An infantryman's basic weapoo is the rifle. That's thy the coelat infantryeas's bodse show the crossed rifles. It is a badge mora with boeot, ofoen to the exclesiee of othet decoratioes and awants.

The bew soldier is insediately inetodaced to his weapos. He is told to tale cate of it always, slecp with it by his side, and to keep it is fins-class moding coodition at all times. He is isstracted in bow to beeak it down asd get it back together agais is the shontest possible timer, is daylight of is darkerss.

Thes the sotdier and his fiffe so to the tathe. These. the serm trooper sqoecres off his firsa romods and feels the power which is is his basds. Five for effect and for recoed against boch stationary and moving targets is the sost inportant part of the meapoes training ptogram. Wore thas any other weapoe, it is the tiffe that will see the infantrymas theongh.

Kell disciplised rifle fise will ofies make the dif. fersece betwres defeat asd vicwory. That the caliber asd rate of five of a rifle clanges froe sencration to gencratioe and froe year to year makes so difference.

## GRENADE PRACTICE

One of the indispensible infaatry weapons is the hasd gresade. This lethal weapon came isto its own in World War I when tooops were engaged in extessive Fechech warfare oo the Kesters Froen.

The greade is a close range weapoos, designed to kill, moesd, harrass, screca and otherwise belp the infantrymen cany oet their assigned missions of offense and delewse.

They coec in masy formsufroe the straperl and coecession greades to the seoke and phospboroes hisds. They cas be thrown, polled down hill, tossed iato dag. cots, or rigeed for booby trapping. Mey can also be ssed to mak positions or scecee advascing troops or they cas be shot from steade tamekers. Theit effect cas be devastating.

All is all, the hasd gresade is a bandy wrapos, a tool of the infantryman's trade $=$ an absolstely secessary ene.

ts the early days of the Revolation whe Ancrica was stregsliag to be born, infantry battles mere fogghe is a manber pacsecribed by Eanopean powets. Two opposing tises of infantry faced obe asother in an open field. afvanced of tetreated as their forteses ellanged, meanmble firing masket volleys from ranges of 100 yards or tess.

Thete were "stand wp" antacks, made by massed inlantry, is line asd in brilliant eniform, as at Katetloo, is the British advance mp Banker Hall and at New Olleass whes the Asericans fired at mill into the advancing lines of red coats. Most soldiers of the fiedgling tafantiy Brigabe wrote oo leave daring the Christmas bolidays. It was a welcoee becal after the stresooss week so flasic Traising.

Thes it was off to Camp Edwards is early Jasaary foe Mratced Individoal Training. Edwands is siteated on Massachusetts" famoss Cape Cod, a favorite summer vacation spot foe civiliass, bet hardly a vacatioe acea for the Brigale soldiers in the middle of the wister. Plesty of soow and cold weather emphasized to the woogs what it meass to tive in the field, especiafly in a New Eagland mintect.

Not all the Beigade was at Edwands at the same time. Aboat three fifths of the men stayed belisd at Fort Devess geing through more training and perforning the eseal boselold deties. Heits weve sofated into Edwards in there inctements from Jasary through the middle of March.

Canp Edwards provided the eecessary space and terrain to satisfy the tequirements of this advasced traisisg period. All of the Brigade's weapons wete ssed and is sait strength sow that the sew men wete becoming familiar with thes.

Most of the Brigadesmes, of coarse, are tiflemee asd beavy weapees ciewere. The $\mathbf{4} .14$ sifle is, perlaps, their best frictod, bet the M-79 gocaade lauscher asd 106 me recoilless rifles. genades. 81 min mortars, the M.60 machise gas, flamethowet and 3.5 tocket lausket wese valved jost as neobl in purticalar siteations. The objective was to make the infastrymers familiat with all these basic wea poes.

Mes of the artillery batralion have learned to bandle their 106 's with skill asd dispatch. Edwaeds acted as a proving groosd with plesty of impact area avaitatte. F Troos and the engibeers also got a chance to pat their specialties of sccoseaissance and esginecring isto practice.
